he Charles Wright
Museum of African
American History in
Detroit, like the theatre
contained within its walls, tells the
story and reaffirms the spirit of
African Americans.

Built through a joint venture by Jenkins Construction, Inc. and Turner Construction Company, the striking edifice on East Warren Avenue and Brush stands as the world's largest African American museum.

The museum's rotunda is shaped by hand-set stone walls, a glass dome of African huts, hand painted flag panels and a specially designed and skillfully executed terrazzo floor.

Michielutti Brothers took artist Hubert Massey's 24" x 18" drawing and expanded it to recreate the design in a terrazzo floor. The finished creation lends itself to fulfill the artist's vision in a hard, durable surface. They also created a five-foot mock-up of the mural. Brass inlays highlight notable African Americans.

This project received an Honorable Mention in the 1997 Honor Awards from the National Terrazzo Mosaic Association.
